## Intern Corner

### Giuliana Stillo, M.A. Doctoral Psychology Intern at the YCS institute

I found my way to the YCS Institute as a student looking for clinical training opportunities with children, and I first joined as a psychology extern in 2020. Not only did I get exposure to infant mental health, but I also learned about providing telehealth services amidst demands for remote work throughout the COVID 19 pandemic. I was excited to learn that YCS would be offering training opportunities for interns again during the 2022-2023 year and made the decision to apply for their year-long doctoral internship.

From previous experiences at YCS, I knew I would likely have opportunities to continue my training in infant and early childhood mental health while receiving reflective supervision to support my learning and work with clients. I was hoping to have an internship that supported these pre-existing interests, while also providing the opportunity to work in a supportive, full-time clinical setting.

After completing the year, I feel I have learned a tremendous amount from a clinical, professional, and personal standpoint. I have had a diverse range of experiences, providing clinical services like therapy and assessment, while also providing and engaging in peer supervision,

## Innovations

### FOSTERING P.R.I.D.E AWARENESS IN TREATMENT HOMES

At a Southern Region Treatment Homes (TH) meeting in April, TH mentor **Anitra Frayer** brought up the idea of finding ways to be more sensitive to the needs of youth with different sexual orientations and identities in their Treatment Homes. She proposed the idea of providing training for current families and strategizing to recruit new families that could provide gender affirming, loving care for youth.

According to Treatment Home AVP **Tracie Bass**, the team was immediately on board. "Anitra came up with a creative idea that we had never really thought about before, and she and **Anthony Raymond** [recruiter] really ran with it...I am very proud of them," said Tracie.



In June, Anthony and Anitra hit the road and attended the Merchantville Pride Day Festival/Fashion Show. They handed out pamphlets and spoke with many participants about the Treatment Homes program. "Everyone was so kind and very receptive," recalled Anitra.

They were both very encouraged by the reception they got from visitors to the event, vendors and helping organizations. "I hope we can continue to raise awareness and help our kids [in YCS THs] to grow and feel comfortable," said Anitra. Several days later, the current Treatment Home parents participated in a training presented by Michele Robbins-YCS Clinical Director-on the challenges and needs of youth who identified as LGBTQ+. The training was very successful and plans for follow-up training in the fall are in the works.

"Our goal for the 2023/2024 fiscal year, is to develop an effective marketing strategy that will help us to connect, establish and build community relationships, and to identify/recruit prospective gender sensitive Treatment Home families," noted Tracie.

# Accomplishments

### NEW ACCOUNTING PROGRAM

Since our last newsletter, the YCS Finance Department-under the leadership of our new CFO Dr. Frank Bockowski—has been diligently working to revamp the agency's accounting system and replace it with Oracle. Since June, administrative assistants, program/house managers, and senior leadership have received multiple trainings to prepare for the roll out in July. This new system will streamline the invoice process, set up a file of approved vendors, reduce the amount of paperwork, and maintain one uniform electronic system across the agency. This will make it easier for persons using the system and reduce agency costs. "We realize that it will take a couple of months for everyone to get used to the new system, but we are here to help," said Dr. Frank.

# Accomplishments

### DCF SELECTS YCS TO OPEN TWO NEW I/DD HOMES



In June, YCS was notified by DCF that the RFPs submitted for the creation of two new group homes for older youth with significant I/DD and behavioral health challenges has been granted by the State. These homes will be a step down from our PCH IDD programs for youth prior to their aging out of the children's system of care into adult DDD services. "We are keenly aware of how desperately this service type is needed, and I am thrilled YCS was awarded both its application/ proposals from DCF through a competitive bidding process." reported Tara Augustine in an email announcing the new programs. One home will be in the southern region and the other in the central region. Tara continued, "I very much appreciate all the folks who contributed to writing and completing the proposals (there were many!), under the grant writing leadership of Christina Colon and Rayletta Garrison."

#### YCS INSTITUTE GRANT NEWS

YCS has received a generous grant of \$49,930 from the Farris Foundation in support of a YCS initiative: Improved Access to Early Intervention Care for Underserved in Hudson County. This grant gives YCS the ability to team up with the North Hudson Community Action Corporation to provide on-site support for babies, toddlers, their caregivers, and staff. "We're excited to teach parents how to best help their children reach important milestones and thrive," says Christina Colon, YCS AVP.



Through the Detection, Connection, Intervention grant, two members of the team have already completed the ADOS-Autism Diagnostic Observation Schedule training (additional staff will be beginning in the fall). Due to this grant, the Institute and clinics are currently providing DIRFloortime treatment to 15 children ages four and under who are affected by autism. "In the past three months we've also been able to assess four children for autism. This is significant considering most programs have 6–12-month waitlists. We plan to assess 20 children in our first year of the project," says Christina.
