## **Leading with Heart**

### Luis Mangual, Facilities Director



If you are trying to catch up to Luis "Louie" Mangual, you better be fast. The YCS Facilitates Director is often on the run overseeing his team who could be at any one of YCS' 62 sites, installing new kitchen cabinets, upgrading a bathroom to meet ADA standards or following up on an emergency repair order. There is no task that Louie is afraid to take on and he does it with enthusiasm and his trademark smile. "Don't worry, we got this," is his classic, upbeat response to a new project or call for help.

Louie joined the YCS family in 1998 after working more than two decades as a licensed boiler

operator/super. He was attracted to YCS because of the benefits. After working for one year at Kilbarchan, he said that he knew he had found the place where he wanted to work until he retired.

Louie recalls his early years on the YCS KB campus, "Back in the day, we did everything. I filled in as an RA when someone called out, drove the kids to appointments if they were short staffed, and took care of all the maintenance on the campus."

What got to him most were the children. "I loved these kids and when the chance came up to coach them for NJ Special Olympics and later the H Olympics, I jumped at the opportunity." His experience as a semi-professional baseball player was a real asset, and his coaching helped the youth win quite a few medals.

"I have worked with Luis for about two years. It is said that integrity is doing what's right when no one is looking. This quote reminds me of Luis - he is committed to putting in the effort to make it right-for the consumers, staff, or his team - whether or not anyone is looking. He is passionate about maintaining the YCS programs in great condition and providing safe and comfortable environments. He leads his team in a way that shows he cares about them and empowers them to provide for those we serve. He truly embodies the leading with heart example for YCS."

## **Leading with Heart**

Over the next 20+ years he was given more opportunities to use all the skills he had acquired as a licensed building superintendent. In 2019, he was promoted to director of facilities in the northern region and with that came added responsibilities. The agency began depending on his leadership and talented team to do site upgrades and renovations in-house. Louie attests that he could never have done this without the mentorship of his former supervisor, the late Wanda Cavanaugh.

"Wanda taught me everything. I would go to her with a problem, and she'd talk to me, give me encouragement, and then tell me to go figure it out." He attributes much of his success in his new role to her belief in him. Today, Louie models his supervisory skills after his mentor.

Louie says the key to the success of his team is respect. "I can't treat everyone the same...I have to find out what each person is good at, their strengths, and what they like to do. This way they can shine on the job."

Luis admits that when he was first promoted to facilities director for the entire agency in 2022 he was "a little scared." There were also a lot of new administrative tasks he had to learn. But those feelings of trepidation passed quickly as he moved into action.

"I like the challenges, and I learn something new every day." Louie is quick to emphatically add that he would not be where he is today without his team or all the support that he has received from his colleagues on the administrative level. "The truth is that for us to be successful - it's not about me it's about the team," says Louie. Now, he oversees 24 employees in the facilities and housekeeping departments.

#### Can you tell us about your journey as an intern at Sayre House.?

Personally, I was able to grow as an individual, learn more about myself, and become so much more confident. Professionally I have grown so much with the help of the staff, especially from Molly Holt and Aimee Briscoe. They have given me many opportunities to learn about social work. We talk daily at the house, and I have gotten so much support from them. I have learned a lot about social work and what it takes to become a licensed clinical social worker.


### Congratulations to Top Scoring Programs for 1st Cycle 2024!
